There are morally significant differences between familiar systems of oppression when expressed in online environments compared to in-person social environments. I specifically examine the examples of gendered threats and exploitation of children

Toxic Positivity

In Progress

The popular phrase “toxic positivity” refers to a significant ethical and epistemic critique. Rather than avoiding positive emotions, individuals should avoid suppressing the negative emotions of others.

The Pain of Being Overlooked

In Progress

The experiences of patients with fibromyalgia illustrate ways that current theories of epistemic injustice fail to be appropriately intersectional. Successful intervention in the medical field requires a different framing of epistemic injustice.
